ANNOUNCEMENT OF VACANCY

The Board of Education of Springfield SD 186, Springfield, Illinois is seeking qualified applicants for the position of Superintendent of Schools. The Board wishes to select a superintendent who will begin work on July 1, 2026.

The Board expects to offer a salary in the range of \$200,000 and \$250,000 and a competitive benefits package including health insurance, dental/vision insurance, life insurance, board paid TRS, board paid THIS, sick leave, vacation days, and professional dues. It is anticipated that the total compensation package will be based on successful experience and education. It is expected that the initial contract will be for a multi-year period, as authorized by Illinois statutes.

Four satellite offices are utilized for additional staff in Student Support Services, the Operations and Maintenance Department, Food Services, the Technology Department, the Instructional Resource Center, and the district's school-based child care program, Project SCOPE.

CURRICULUM — Springfield Public School District 186 is committed to ensuring every student graduates ready for college, career, and life. At the center of this work is AVID (Advancement Via Individual Determination), a proven framework that emphasizes culture, leadership, instruction, systems, and equity. Guided by our Theory of Action, district leaders work together to support and build capacity among administrators and staff, maintain clear and high expectations, and align efforts in service of every student, family, and school community. This focus ensures all students have equitable access to rigorous learning opportunities and the tools they need to be empowered, successful, and future-ready.

SPECIAL SERVICES — District 186's Student Support Services Department's mission is to provide support for the success of every student in District 186 through a continuum of services for students with disabilities from preschool, age three, through high school graduation. Specialized services are also provided for limited English proficient students, students with health needs, and students with social emotional needs. The department cultivates a learning community that recognizes every student is a general education student first and foremost. Our inclusive practices instructional environment aspires to empower students with diverse learning needs to reach their full potential.

FACILITIES — In November 2018, Sangamon County residents passed the County School Facility Sales Tax, imposing a 1% sales tax on qualifying retail purchases throughout the county. The tax provides a sustainable funding source for school infrastructure projects. TRANSPORTATION — District 186 provides comprehensive transportation services through a contract with First Student. To enhance communication and convenience for families, District 186 utilizes the FirstView app, which allows parents and guardians to track bus locations in real-time, receive notifications, and access route information. Additionally, we provide families with a dedicated transportation hotline for assistance and inquiries.

FOOD SERVICE — District 186 Food Services offers free breakfast and lunch district-wide through the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), eliminating the need for individual free or reduced lunch applications. We also offer a summer meal program for children under the age of 18 throughout the community.

THE COMMUNITY

MEDICAL — Springfield's medical district is recognized globally for its advanced healthcare systems and comprehensive care. Anchored by two major hospitals, HSHS St. John's Hospital and Springfield Memorial Hospital, the city is also home to the Southern Illinois University School of Medicine, Springfield Clinic (a leading multispecialty practice), and the state-operated Andrew McFarland Mental Health Center.

This robust network of hospitals, clinics, wellness centers, and specialty providers ensures residents access to world-class care and attracts patients from across the nation and beyond. The majority of these facilities are located within the Mid-Illinois Medical District, a concentrated square-mile area just north of downtown that fosters collaboration, innovation, and growth in healthcare delivery.

Springfield's extensive healthcare community offers valuable partnerships that expand opportunities for District 186 students. In collaboration with Springfield Memorial Health, the district offers Project SEARCH, a unique transition-to-work program designed for young adults with intellectual, developmental, and other disabilities who need an intensive year of career development, internship experience, and support to reach their goals. In partnership with Southern Illinois University School of Medicine, District 186 also participates in the Physician Pipeline Preparatory Program (P4). This four-year, after-school curriculum introduces students interested in medicine to medical school-style coursework, mentoring, and hands-on learning. Additionally, the Health and Science Academy at Southeast High School provides students interested in medicine, health, and science careers opportunities to explore and develop their skills.

RECREATION — Springfield offers an exceptional quality of life with a wide range of family-friendly attractions and year-round activities. From the Route 66 drive-in theater, Henson Robinson Zoo, and Knights Action Park to nationally significant Abraham Lincoln and Route 66 historic sites, the community blends recreation with cultural depth. Seasonal events, such as the Lincoln Half Marathon, the Illinois State Fair, and downtown concerts and festivals, add vibrancy and provide opportunities for connection across generations.

Outdoor recreation is at the heart of the Springfield lifestyle. Families enjoy boating on Lake Springfield, hiking at Lincoln Memorial Gardens, or camping at nearby state parks. The Springfield Muni outdoor amphitheater, farmers markets, art fairs, and music festivals create a lively cultural scene, while country clubs, local parks, and recreational leagues ensure abundant opportunities for sports, wellness, and community engagement.

The region's newest addition, a state-of-the-art sports park, further enhances these opportunities by providing premier fields, indoor and outdoor facilities for a variety of sports and other activities. Through a partnership with the Springfield Public Schools, the sports park also expands access for district athletes, strengthening both community connections and opportunities for youth development.

PLACES OF WORSHIP — Springfield offers a diverse and welcoming faith community, reflecting a broad range of traditions and cultures. The city is home to numerous places of worship, including long-established Christian congregations across denominations. Vibrant Catholic parishes, thriving Protestant churches, and historic African

American churches play a central role in our community. Springfield is also enriched by Jewish, Muslim, Greek Orthodox, Buddhist, Hindu, and other faith communities, which offer opportunities for spiritual connection, interfaith dialogue, and cultural engagement. This breadth of worship options reflects the city's inclusive character and provides residents abundant opportunities to practice their faith and build community.

Beyond spiritual life, Springfield's faith community actively partners with the Springfield Public Schools through initiatives such as those led by the Faith Coalition for the Common Good and Catholic Charities, among others.

CULTURAL — Springfield offers a cultural landscape that blends distinguished heritage with a dynamic arts community. As the hometown of Abraham Lincoln, the city features nationally recognized historic sites and museums, including the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum, which draws visitors from around the world. The Illinois State Museum, Dana-Thomas House designed by Frank Lloyd Wright, and a wide range of local galleries and cultural institutions provide opportunities to experience world-class history, architecture, and art close to home.

Beyond its historic legacy, Springfield supports a thriving performing arts scene with the Hoogland Center for the Arts, UIS Performing Arts Center, Springfield Muni Opera, and the Illinois Symphony Orchestra. Seasonal festivals, live music venues, and local theaters add to the city's energy and sense of community. Together, these cultural experiences create a well-rounded and engaging environment for professionals and their families, offering both unique local character and access to nationally significant institutions.

RETAIL — Springfield offers a convenient retail and lifestyle environment. White Oaks Mall, located in one of Springfield's two major shopping corridors, is complemented by other major retailers in the area such as Scheels, Target, and Sam's Club for everyday essentials. Distinctive boutiques, antiques, and specialty shops in the historic downtown and neighborhoods add local charm and variety. These retail hubs are enhanced by a wide selection of dining options, ranging from nationally recognized restaurants to chef-driven local favorites, as well as a variety of entertainment venues that include movie theaters, live music spaces, and family attractions.

District 186 collaborates with the Simon Property Group, owners of White Oaks Mall, to provide space for the Springfield Learning Academy, an alternative high school designed to meet the needs of the non-traditional and truant students from the three Springfield public high schools.

FRATERNAL AND PROFESSIONAL ORGANIZATIONS — Springfield has a long tradition of civic engagement and professional networking, offering a range of organizations that foster leadership, service, and connection. The city is home to active chapters of Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions, and other service clubs, as well as Masonic and fraternal lodges with deep community roots. A strong network of professional associations supports advancement across industries, including business, healthcare, education, law, and government. Groups including the Greater Springfield Chamber of Commerce, Leadership Springfield, the Springfield Sangamon Growth Alliance, American Association of University Women, and numerous industry-specific organizations provide opportunities to build relationships, engage in community leadership, and contribute to the region's continued growth.

The Springfield Public Schools Foundation partners with District 186 to strengthen the district, cultivate community support, and fund innovative programs that address the evolving needs of students and educators. Through a variety of grants to teachers and students, the Foundation helps create meaningful opportunities that enhance learning across District 186.

COLLEGES — Springfield is home to a strong network of higher education institutions that serve as anchors for talent, innovation, and community partnerships. The University of Illinois Springfield (UIS) offers more than 100 undergraduate and graduate programs, including AACSB-accredited business degrees, nationally recognized online programs, and a culture of civic leadership. UIS also partners with Springfield Public Schools on an innovative teacher pipeline program, preparing and placing new educators directly into local classrooms to strengthen the region's education workforce. Adjacent to UIS, Lincoln Land Community College (LLCC) provides accessible and affordable education with transfer programs, workforce training, and specialized certificates that prepare students for in-demand careers. Springfield is also home to the Southern Illinois University School of Medicine, a nationally recognized leader in medical education, research, and clinical care, which partners closely with Springfield's major healthcare systems. Together, these institutions create a robust talent pipeline and provide opportunities for collaboration across education, healthcare, and industry.

INDUSTRY — Springfield's economy is anchored by a strong public sector presence, with the State of Illinois serving as the city's largest employer with 17,800 staff. Healthcare is another cornerstone, with Memorial Health System, Hospital Sisters Health System, and Springfield Clinic together employing more than 12,000 professionals.

Springfield Public Schools District 186 ranks as the fifth-largest employer with more than 2,100 dedicated professionals. Higher education further strengthens the region, with UIS, LLCC, and SIU School of Medicine collectively employing nearly 3,800 faculty and staff. Financial services and a growing professional services sector contribute to the city's economic vitality. Springfield also benefits from advanced manufacturing, construction, agriculture, and logistics operations that connect the city to regional and national markets.
